## Vilnius Libraries: the soul of the city

Vilnius, the capital of Lithuania, is a UNESCO City of Literature, best known for its multilingual writing tradition and printing culture. By recounting the history of libraries and life stories of librarians during the Nazi German and Soviet Russian occupations of Lithuania, Laimonas Briedis shines the light on this Orphic spirit of a city. Since its early days, the city has been a notable centre of Lithuanian, Jewish, Polish and Ruthenian (Belorussian and Ukrainian) book life, with both public and private libraries being key sites of national resistance and cultural self-determination. Laimonas Briedis is a writer and scholar of history, literature and the geographical imagination of Lithuania.



#### Madly, Deeply: Neil Pearson on the **Alan Rickman Diaries**

Alan Rickman remains one of the most beloved actors of all time across almost every genre, from his breakout role as Die Hard's villainous Hans Gruber to his heart-wrenching run as Professor Severus Snape, and beyond. From 1993 until his death in 2016, he also kept diaries: anecdotal, indiscreet, witty, gossipy, utterly candid; over a million words in Rickman's calligraphic hand (adorned with beautiful illustrations) reflecting his previous career as a graphic designer. On Rickman's death, the diaries were passed to personal friend and fellow actor Neil Pearson by his widow, Rima; and acting on instruction, Neil secured a publishing deal with Cannongate, sight unseen, and the diaries were published in October last year. In this in-conversation event, Neil talks about the process of bringing the diaries to publication.



#### Stitched Up: Stories of Life and Death from a Prison Doctor

Dr Shahed Yousaf spends his time running between emergencies - from overdoses to assaults, from cell fires to suicides - with one hand perpetually hovering over the panic button. Being a prison doctor is not for the faint-hearted. Dr Y chooses not to ask what crimes his patients have committed - they are patients first and prisoners second. Shahid will be in conversation about his book Stitched Up. In the words of Kit de Waal: "Whatever you think you know about men in prison... Yousaf's memoir will open your eyes and your heart and make you wish things were different."
